ST. BERNARDINE OF SIENA



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St Bernardine was the son of the governor of Siena.

He was orphaned at age six and was brought up by his aunt. He became a Franciscan friar at the age of twenty two and travelled all over Italy, preaching several sermons a day to large crowds.

He is remembered for his devotion

At the end of his sermons he would hold up for veneration a plague on which he wrote IHS - the Greek translation of 'Jesus'.

Through his preaching, Bernardine was responsible for a vast number of conversions to Christianity. In 1437 he became the vicar-general of the Observant branch of the friars, during which time the number of Observants rose tenfold due to his popularity. After establishing theology schools for the friars, he returned to his favourite task of preaching at the age of sixty three, but

PARISH MESSAGE FROM FATHER MICHAEL:



Dear Parishioners,
Like the rest of the world, we continue
to "do our bit" in counteracting and
minimising the effects of the scourge of
CoronaVirus in Australia: We are
looking forward to getting back to
normal. As Catholics we miss being
able to gather as a Church family. We
feel like being deprived of our "comfort

blanket" of Mass and the Sacraments. We feel a bit like our first Catholic Convicts of over 200 years ago.

It must be more than a coincidence, that Fr John Therry and Fr Philip Connolly arrived in Sydney on 3 May 1820 as the first of two Catholic Chaplains recognised by the Government of the time.

They arrived 30 years after the first Catholic convicts arrived, scared and apprehensive of a vast empty continent. Fr Therry, the first Parish Priest of Campbelltown(and the rest of Australia!), was a man of great zeal and love for his flock, most of whom had been deprived of Mass and the Sacraments for years

On arrival, he had 16,000 Catholics, mostly convicts, most longing for the comfort and strength of the Church's Ministry and Sacramental life.

While our situtation and conditions in 2020 are not as drastic as they were for our early Catholic forebearers, we can, like them, long for better days and continue to support each other while we journey. We are a bit like Moses and his Jewish people in Old Testament times, lost in the desert, but knowing that the Promised Land was ahead.

Please read today's (6^{th} Sunday of Easter) Gospel passage in the Bulletin, as we come to the end of Eastertime. It tells us, in 2020, that we are "tied up in the Trinity". Lets take it a few words at a time:-

"I (Jesus) am in the Fatheryou (in Ruse) are in me and I am in you.....I will not leave you orphans.....I will send you the Holy Spirit". In other words, as we assist, we must remember we are not alone – He is with us. Lets together, (in isolation!) pray about that.

Let's also pray for continued wisdom and guidance for our Government Leaders and health authorities as they lead us through confusing times. We commend to a rewarding God our Doctors, Nurses and Medial Staff in the most difficult and challenging phase of ther professional lives.

God Bless you all. I will continue to offer daily Mass for you.
